ALPACAS ON TOUR

Imants and Mabel Schneider rear alpacas on their croft near Balmedie. They currently have a herd of 48 animals and produce high quality yarn from the annual fleece harvest. This is then turned into beautifully finished products. Here Imants describes the hazards that can face these adorable, gentle creatures as they venture out of home territory.



It was a beautiful sunny day so we decided to take four of our Alpacas out for a beach trek to give them an exposure to a different environment than just the four boundaries of our croft. However, we were a little apprehensive as to how they might react in a completely strange, unknown environment. Nevertheless we set off with fingers crossed.

We managed to get the trailer parked close to the South car park at Balmedie Beach. People interested to see and talk about these very unusual visitors to the beach immediately approached us. The alpacas did look rather worried and unsure about their surroundings and must have been wondering what was yet to come.

We headed towards the beach along the slatted path but immediately the four intrepid explorers felt that this strange surface was maybe not for them to walk on. Eventually we managed to move them on and we headed towards the sea. Every turn in the path presented new fears of predators like pumas that could jump out any second. Fortunately they were lucky and the greatest predator encountered was only a wee Terrier. However, a new threat was looming as we went closer to the sea. The roaring ocean was something they had never experienced before but as the noise only increased very gradually as we grew nearer, they came to accept it was safe enough. Then just as we approached the beach we were confronted with a very steep sandy drop, which clearly would not be easy to descend. Having got this far we decided that we had to have a go. The first two alpacas went down in a somewhat undignified manner slipping and sliding down the bank. The next two realised they would have to follow if they were to stay with their friends. Down they came with trepidation and luckily all survived without incident.



Waves, sand, noise, paparazzi, people, dogs, flotsam – all quite new to them. However they took it all in their stride and made for the water where they paddled contentedly. They were having a great day out. We were very impressed and pleased with people's sense responsibility as they put their dogs on leads when they saw the alpacas. The tide was coming in so we made for the Eigie burn and prepared to get back. However, there was more danger to come in the form of the wooden bridge with murky, muddy bogs on either side and of course no safety rails. This was a nail-biting crossing for us as the slightest thing could have spooked the animals. However we made it across as the alpacas behaved like real troupers.

Around the Sand Bothy there was such a lively buzz. We worried that the alpacas would be nervous and intimidated. It was quite the opposite in fact - they were happy to indulge in cuddles and kisses from anyone who chose to pet them. It is almost impossible not to fall in love with such calm, soothing beasties that simply ooze warmth and friendliness. To experience so many new situations and unusual sights in such a short time must have been stressful. From crowds of people to funny paths, sand dunes, steep slopes, waves, dogs, paparazzi, drones, remote controlled cars, loud children, just about everything you can think of that is normal to us but for alpacas as a first experience, it must have been daunting. Surprisingly, they were quite relaxed and interacted well with everyone, soaking up all the attention.

We felt we had achieved a bit of a record. We set off at mid day from the South car park and after 4 hours had covered the challenging distance of 1.92 miles! How much slower can anyone get? All the attention we got had something to do with that. We hope it made a day at the beach more enjoyable for everyone.

PARISH THREADS

Wind, Sand and Stars

Everything is but a path, a portal or a window opening on something other than itself. Antoine de Saint-Exupéry, 1939.

Belhelvie, previously lightly scribbled upon by roads and bridleways, now has the firm imprint of dual carriageway roundabouts and a wind-farm offshore at Black Dog. All the previous wandering journeys lie underneath this dramatic coastal statement creating our very own parish palimpsest. With its five habitations a hand spread on a map, Belhelvie has always been an area for wandering with a history of connections and strangers passing through. Beaten tracks appeared as there was a need for



them. We know that when Samuel Johnson and James Boswell rode from Marischal College through the parish to Slains Castle in 1774, Boswell recorded that the road beyond Aberdeen 'grew more and more stony and was naked of all vegetable decoration.'

By the 1820s the road had been improved and mail coach passengers in the cheap seats on top would have been bumped and jostled up the coast road from Aberdeen to Ellon. Wrapped up against the brisk wind they would have looked out over bleak dunes to the German Ocean and up to the Beaker burial mound at Hare Cairn. There would have been much relief when the coachman pulled the team up at the Blairton Inn for warmth and refreshments. It was the feet of the Beaker people 2000 years B.C. who made the first lines of desire between shelter, work and food-sources. Not much had changed by 1890 when James McBey, walked the 15 miles from his grandparents' forge near Foveran to Aberdeen to buy a paint box and brushes. At the same time Rev. William Temple travelled all over the area on horseback to compile a history published as 'The Thanage of Fermartyn'. He reported that the land of Belhelvie was stony and poorly drained and there were many cobblers but barefoot children.

In 1926 the parish was a section of a healthy hike north to Ellon for W.M. Henry a teacher at Aberdeen Grammar School. In his 'Byways Round Aberdeen' he describes the land north of the Milden Burn as being, 'away from the frousty accumulations of domestic hibernation, the sea of chrysophrase broken only by a line of snowy breakers below a pearly lather of cloud'. Remember that if you will! Up to the war it was enough for parish children to be taken by charabanc for their annual picnic along meandering tracks down to Black Dog or to the hill above Ardo for tea and races.

Would St Colm recognise this land now with all the changes wrought upon it? St Colm was Belhelvie's 6th century Christian tutelary, the protector of our area. His

name remains in the old Belhelvie Churchyard but his memory has faded and his name didn't travel to the new church at Drumhead. Most things fade into the darkness black holes (even Steven Hawking) although recently on a visit to an observatory I was shown the four bright moons of Jupiter. Callisto, Io, Europa and Ganymede. '...and the view we are seeing now,' a young scientist enthused breathlessly into the telescope, 'is the same that Galileo saw in 1610.' 'Unless' he added, in an attempt to be amusing 'Elon Musk's Tesla roadster is passing by.'

I have continued with the writing of my family's history and maybe by the time Elon Musk has set up his settlement on Mars my great grandchildren will be appreciating it. To add context to my mother's story I have been adding events that occurred during her lifetime. For instance in the year she was born, 1921, Amelia Earhart bought her first plane. As usual, life has a way of adding odd synchronicity. Just as I was finishing the text there was news that bones found in the Pacific had been re examined and are now considered to be those of the long lost aviator. I could never have predicted that the stories of Mum and Ms Earhart would intersect in such a curious way? Then I remembered the story of the man who was interviewed for two available jobs. He lost to the other applicants: a Mr Fische and a Mr Kettle. He said afterwards he could never be sure why he didn't get the job.

A WORD FROM THE DOC...

All Change... Yet Again!

It was a long, dreich and at times cold winter, so it was a relief when spring crept in. Now we await summer. As I write there are some promising signs of warmer days, but we all know not

to hold our breath! I do hope that you are all trying to move more and eat less, even though New Year resolutions are now as distant as the new offshore wind turbines are not!

Many of you will be aware that there is now a much-heralded new contract for GPs in effect. This has taken some time to negotiate, and indeed is not yet complete as we have only started phase one. The plans for phase two are, to say the least, *complex*, but will result in significant changes for patients if all goes as planned.

The backdrop to the contract is also quite complex, as there has been huge concern for many years at the lack of doctors choosing GP as a career. In the last decade there has been a large expansion in consultant numbers, but the number of GPs has been steady, with a continuing fall in full-time GPs. The situation is complicated by the increasing number of GPs who choose to, or for family reasons need to, work part-time. Many younger doctors, it is thought, also do not like the idea of running a business, being responsible for employing staff, owning and maintaining a surgery building and the extra work away from patient care that this all entails. Many people do not realise that a GP in a partnership is usually NOT salaried by the NHS, but works as an independent, self-employed, contractor.

To try and address this the new GP contract will recast the GP as an "Expert Medical Generalist". This is to try and make becoming a GP appeal more to younger doctors and send a message to patients about the role of the GP in the primary care team. It is also hoped that this will help address the negative image of GP that sadly still pervades in the hospital setting. A recent survey of medical students throughout the UK found that over 90% reported denigration of GPs by consultants and academics working in hospital or universities.

For patients this will mean that the changes that have already started will continue to gather pace. You may not see a GP when you attend your practice, as you may be "signposted" (to use the "in" term in management speak!) to see another health professional. This has good and bad effects. The role of the GP in continuing patient care will be fragmented and patients may end up having to make multiple visits instead of one. An example would be a patient attending for a review of a chronic condition, say high blood pressure. Currently a patient will see their GP or practice nurse for this annually in the autumn. At this visit they will have a BP check, review of medication, perhaps a blood test arranged and if eligible a flu jab. As well as all this, you may well wish to ask about something else, if seeing the GP, and this will be

addressed at that time. A good example of such a question is the current issue about the pros and cons around having a prostate (PSA) blood test. A GP will view this as a straightforward consultation, and usually deal with this and the routine aspects of the review all at one visit. Under the new system this will all change.

The patient may see a pharmacist for a BP check and drug review, then need to make an appointment with the vaccination service for the flu jab and, if needed, an appointment with the phlebotomy service for the blood test and when they mention that they wish to ask about the PSA blood test for the prostate they will be told that the need to see their GP to discuss this. With this new scheme one visit has become possibly four!

No wonder change can be regarded rather skeptically! To quote the American author Charlton Ogburn (sadly not the ancient Roman Pertonius): "We trained hard, but it seemed that every time we were beginning to form up into teams we would be re-organised ... a wonderful method it can be for creating the illusion of progress, whilst producing confusion, inefficiency and demoralisation." I am sure all NHS staff will recognise this!

The changes that are planned are not without potential problems. It is evident that the well-intended steps to try and improve the situation for GP recruitment may have unintended consequences for us all. These new services I have alluded to will be commissioned and run by the new Integrated Joint Boards, and there are significant challenges ahead for these new organisations.

Currently practices are, overall, run very efficiently, and tend to have low management costs. This is not something that can be said about much of the health care system in the NHS. This observation is borne out by the problems health boards met when they have had to take over the running of GP practices.

There is a long way to go on this road and what transpires at the end of the phase we are now in is not yet clear. I hope that this helps give you all a flavour of what is happening, and that patients will have a voice in how things shape up.

On that note I would like to share that the RCGP in Scotland has vacancies on its patients' body, P3. This committee ensures that RCGP policy has a patient voice and input, as the RCGP in turn advises policy making in Scotland. Fingers crossed for not only the weather, but also for the brave new world of General Practice. Hope we will have plenty long sunny days to look forward to, so there can be no excuses about getting out for that long walk!





BALMEDIE BEACH WHEELCHAIRS

What are we doing?

Belhelvie Community Trust and The Sand Bothy are working with Aberdeenshire Council to improve access to Balmedie Beach. Because of the dunes system it is not always easy to get down on the sand, especially if you have a disability. We now have use of a big store, the Sand Bunker, which is in Balmedie Country Park, on the way to the beach. We are working with PAMIS (promoting a more inclusive society) and Pony AxeS to provide a range of ways of accessing the beach. To achieve this, we need to buy some all-terrain wheelchairs to lend out for sessions to families and carers of children with disabilities.

What do we need?

- MONEY: To get started with one chair, a hoist and a phone, we will need around £5,000. To provide a variety of chairs so that we can cater for a range of disabilities we would need around a further £10.000. We are dependent on donations and charitable funding to buy the chairs and hoist, so we would be grateful for anything you can give.
- VOLUNTEERS: We will need help to run the project, arrange bookings, maintain access and chairs, and generally support families who are using the project.

IMPROVE YOUR SPINE, HELP YOUR BOWEL!



Every organ in our body is connected through our spinal cord. Our lungs know to breathe and our digestive system knows how to work thanks to the communication from the brain (and mind). These 'orders' arrive and affect the cells of the organs. This keeps us alive and, thankfully, is automatic!

The spine is really the link between the mind, the brain and organs and they all communicate. Any interference, for example due to a small segment of the spine not moving as it should can cause pressure, congestion, inflammation, swelling resulting in interference in that all important message. In this case, the bowel may give signs and symptoms or may just degenerate a bit and give problems in the future.

The body's general functioning depends on the spine. The twelfth thoracic vertebra (T12) nerves communicate with the small and large intestines. The first lumbar vertebra (L1) connects with the intestines and imbalances that create constipation and indigestion. If the basin holding the small and large bowel is distorted, it makes sense that the contents will suffer! All the more reason to ensure the pelvis, the foundation, is the best that it can be.

When stressed, the bowel becomes agitated, leading to inflammation and diarrhoea along with what can be unbearable, colic. Persistent aggravation may lead to parts of the bowel not responding. This gives the unpredictable signs and symptoms of diarrhoea alternating with constipation with colic leading to more anxiety and more stress. High levels of stress have been proven to make pain worse.

Logically, back pain is usually present, too. After strain, specific injury or disease itself, the body accommodates by adjusting the posture to its most pain free position.

Compensation gradually builds up until the body cannot accommodate any more change. This is when some extra stress can cause it to break down at its weakest part: in this case the bowel.



Touch therapies help to goad the body's own pharmacy into action and allow the body to heal itself. Osteopathy and Remedial Massage maintain or restore better structure and thus, better function in the bowel. Reflexology allows the bowel to be worked through the feet! All this is non-invasive so definitely worth a try. Diet and keeping the gut biome at its optimum is necessary too — but that is another story. Happy bowels usually mean a happy YOU!

NATURAL BFLHFLVIF

With summer on the doorstep and the days of the 'simmer dim' only weeks away you have plenty of time to enjoy the wealth of natural goodies on offer in Belhelvie Parish. It is the very fact that we do get the 'simmer dim' this far north that brings us birds like swallows, martins, warblers, and cuckoos, all swarming north for their simmer, sorry summer holidays. With the sun barely having time to put on its goonie before taking it off again, there is loads of daylight in which mums and dads can feed hungry bairns. The young of small birds are like our own wee ones, and cannot last without food through the long hours of darkness that occurs farther south, hence they all come to visit us.

I have mentioned before about the difference between swallows and martins, and all that you need to do is to look where they nest. Swallows inside a building – an open garage, old shed, but *always* inside. Martins build their mud nests tucked up against the soffits and the wall underneath the eaves of a house, or something similar, but always *outside*. If you live near the quarry in Belhelvie you might see sand martins, a browner colour than house martins, and these birds dig a tunnel in a bank of sand or earth, therefore they may breed in the quarry.

As I write, the swallows etc. are still on their way, but birds that are permanent residents hereabouts point us towards the summer. Already I have seen and more to the point heard skylarks taking to the air and singing their wee hearts out as they soar higher and higher, before suddenly swooping down in a series of dives. The beginning of April is early for them to be serenading from on high but by the time that you read this (you do read it don't you?) there will be lots of them on the go. They are superb songsters that appear to have an endless supply of melodies to offer. They favour open grassy areas, fields and the like, but also moorland as long as it is dry. If you get a close look you will note that they are larger than a sparrow, with white underparts and streaky brown above. One distinguishing feature is a small but prominent crest of feathers on the head. They nest on the ground in a tussock of grass and use dried grass to form their nest. You might confuse them with the meadow pipit, that is found in similar places, very slightly smaller but it does not have the crest on its head, and they do not fly up into the sky singing either. Refer to that bird identification book that Santa put in your stocking last Christmas.



The delightful primrose will be on its way back to bed for the summer by now but a close relative the cowslip will be flowering (pictured). Sadly, this beautiful native wildflower is much scarcer today, I have old books that give recipes for cowslip wine! Wow, you would not get very drunk on all of the cowslip wine made today. It is a member of the primula family and originally a plant of grassy meadows where cows wandered around chomping at the vegetation. The common name (one of many) relates to the fact that it grew in places where cows left 'sharny dubs'

(cowpats). These were once referred to as simply 'slips' or cowslips, and the plants growing close by were given the same name. A shame for such a lovely flower. Take care if you go looking for them, and do not 'slip' up!

BELHELVIE NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

The Belhelvie Neighbourhood Watch continues to operate within Belhelvie and there's always scope for you to set up your own scheme for your street or Neighbourhood! Full details can be found at www.neighbourhoodwatchscotland.co.uk

As summer is here and we spend lots of our time in the garden, why not keep in mind that the design of your garden can improve the security of your home. This would certainly help out in winter!

Defensive planting

Boundaries of thick and prickly plants and shrubs are not easy to climb over. This makes crossing densely planted areas difficult to do quickly or quietly. Use plants and shrub beds to protect the following vulnerable areas:

- Under vulnerable windows.
- Around areas that could be climbed on.
- Around the boundary of your garden where there may be easy access from the outside.
- Along the entire boundary if your home backs onto open land.

Plants recommended for such use include: pyracantha, holly, mahonia, rose, gorse, berberis, blackberry and hawthorn

At the front of your home, the recommended **maximum height** of shrubs is 1M and the **minimum height** from the ground of tree canopies is 3M. This will reduce a burglar's opportunity to hide out of sight.

Lighting

As well as security lighting around your house, consider installing dusk till dawn sensor lighting in other areas of your garden, especially around sheds and outbuildings. Consider installing in areas of the garden that are shadowy and dark at night. Think about where a burglar might hide. You might also want to think about defensive planting in that area too. Do not use lighting in a position where it dazzles you or prevents you from seeing into the area beyond it.

At the rear of properties, consider using motion detection security lighting. Mount this type of lighting about 2.75M high with the sensor pointing downwards. Please consider your neighbours and don't use a light that exceeds 150W.

Other considerations

- Noisy and crunchy surfaces such as gravel and shingle can prevent someone moving around quietly. Consider using around outbuildings, shed and narrow passageways.
- Remove loose bricks and stones.
- Use concrete or mortar to secure rockeries and planters.
- Secure dustbins using a bicycle chain or d-lock fixed to a suitable point (such as a ground anchor).
- Lock your tools away.
- Speak to your neighbours and ask them to report suspicious activity to the police.





ABERDEEN OFFSHORE WIND FARM UPDATE

Construction of the Aberdeen Offshore Wind Farm is well under way with multiple of the world's most powerful turbines and innovative suction bucket jacket foundations already installed. The eleven turbine scheme is due to be completed this summer.



The substation construction is also concluding with final mechanical and electrical works ongoing in preparation for the transportation of the clean electricity from the wind farm.

ALL CHANGE ON THE AWPR

The progress being made on the Aberdeen Western Peripheral Route across our area can be clearly seen as the works continue towards completion. Road users are seeing the benefits of this with vehicles now using part of the new route between Tipperty and Foveran, as well as the new Blackdog and Balmedie Junctions. The newly-completed Blackdog junction will improve local access to Potterton, Belhelvie, Blackdog and Blackdog Industrial Estate, and also a number of local properties.

While work is taking place, we are getting more and more used to the changing temporary speed restrictions, diversion signs, lane closures and route changes, not to mention bus stop variations. Drivers in the area must be applauded for their careful driving and adherence to the restrictive measures

The project team is working hard to complete the remaining works so that the road can be brought into full operation. Traffic management will remain in place in some locations and will be phased to keep disruption to a minimum. With the aim of improving travel in the northeast, the AWPR is one of the largest infrastructure projects in Scotland. Once completed, it will include 58km of new road, 40km of new side roads, and 30km of access tracks. It will have 12 junctions, two river crossings at River Dee and River Don, and a bridge over the Aberdeen to Inverness Railway. It also will feature four major pipeline crossings, three wildlife bridges, and more than 100 other structures.





The project had previously been expected to open during Spring 2018, but is now scheduled for completion this autumn. There have been a number of issues that have contributed to this, including the impact of severe stormy weather over the last three winters, and the collapse of Carillion.

Economy Secretary Keith Brown comments:

"I understand how highly anticipated this project is for those living and working in the region and the patience local communities have shown during the construction process, I would like to thank them for their continued patience as we enter the final stages of the project".

The total cost of the project is £745 million and during construction over 1000 jobs have been created. The downturn in the North Sea oil and gas industry has had a significant negative effect on the employment market in this area. Fortunately, the AWPR has provided new work for a considerable number of employees who were unemployed due to losing their positions in the industry. The AWPR is predicted to generate over £6 billion for the local economy with an anticipated 14,000 new jobs to follow over the first 30 years after the scheme opens.


