CREATING NEW WOODLANDS



The company 'Forest Carbon Ltd', based in Durham, supports the creation of new woodlands in the UK on behalf of individuals and companies wanting to capture the unavoidable carbon dioxide emissions that arise from their activities, and make a wider contribution to local environments and communities at the same time. Here, James Hepburne Scott, a director of Forest Carbon highlights the wonderful work that has been going on at Balmedie Farm, Belhelvie.

In the Spring of this year Malcolm and Maureen Ross (seen above) planted a new woodland on Balmedie Farm on the east side of the burn just north of the village. It extends to almost 8 hectares and has a fine mix of species. A quarter is spruce, sitka and Norway, which will eventually be harvested for timber. The UK imports over 80% of its timber needs, so this will be an important contribution. The rest is beech, sycamore, oak, birch, rowan and more. In addition to timber it will be great for wildlife and shelter. The project was designed and managed by Simon Jacyna of SAC.

The Forestry Commission grant was not sufficient to enable Malcolm and Maureen to go ahead, so additional funding was obtained by the sale of carbon offset credits to the Fuel Store, a fuel card company, arranged by carbon specialists Forest Carbon Ltd.

Over the next 70 years the woodland will capture over 2,300 tonnes of carbon dioxide from the atmosphere. That is approximately what is emitted by an average-sized car driving 12 million miles!

Malcolm Ross of Balmedie Farm adds -

When we took on running the farm in 1982 it was very windswept so trees seemed to be an answer, giving shelter to our suckler cow enterprise. We started with two hand-sown hedges, alder and hawthorn along a ditch and part of the Eigie Burn. The next project was a grant-aided wood on 4 acres of a sandy gorse covered brae. Planting this coincided with a spring drought so we did think that we had a disaster on our hands, but 34 years on it is quite a decent wood.

The grant system was becoming generous, so in 1983 two small fields amounting to 10 acres, which were a nuisance with the modern machinery, were planted in a mix of conifers and broadleaves. Hedges were next, 1500 metres over 5 fields, mostly not grant aided as the rules could be quite restrictive. Our last project this year has been 18 acres of mixed conifers and native broadleaves surrounded by a most impressive deer fence, and that's it - any more trees will have to be for someone else to do!

My name is Graeme Laird and I am a Station Commander within the Scottish Fire & Rescue Service. I am writing to encourage everyone to sign up for our flagship home fire safety programme where Firefighters will visit your property and offer professional advice for your safety. I think this is a particularly relevant time to promote this service due to a

recent house fire in the village of Balmedie and the fact that we are rapidly moving towards the winter period.

It is relevant to warn that accidental house fires can be caused by increased use of heating and electrical appliances at this time of year, as well as higher alcohol consumption during the holiday season.

SFRS will soon be launching our winter's awareness campaign to urge families to stay safe over this festive period. This winter we will be working closely with local communities and partner agencies to keep Scotland safe from fire and non-fire emergencies, but as always, we need your help to reduce the amount of preventable fires we might see in the coming months.

We would like to offer you, your families, friends and neighbours a free Home Fire Safety Visit. These are a key part of our fire prevention work and help safeguard and reassure anyone who receives one.

Free home fire safety visits take around 20 minutes to complete and are conducted by friendly local SFRS crews at a time convenient for the householder.

It is with great sadness that we pass on the news that our popular columnist, Bob Davis, has died. A keen conservationist, Bob was renowned for his extraordinary knowledge of the natural world, which he generously shared, influencing many young minds and urging us all to take care of the world we live in. He was an adventurer and intrepid explorer, taking off into the wilderness to be at one with nature. We were privileged to have Bob with us on Banter, sharing his wonderful wit and wisdom. Our thoughts are with Bob's family at this sad time. He will be missed by many.

So here we offer you Bob's final Banter column, which we think is very appropriate at this time. This was originally published in the 'Foveran News' (thank you to Janet Jones for sharing this).

We leave you to read about Bob Davis, in his own words.

BOB DAVIS on BOB DAVIS

I hope that I do not traumatise you when I reveal that I was born in England, oh shock horror! But, ah yes there is always a 'but'. My paternal great grandmother was a Burns, and me with the name of Robert! A Bob's a Bob for a' that!

I was a War Baby, born in 1941 in Aylesbury, and lived in the town of Chesham, in the middle of the Chiltern Hills. I left Secondary Modern School at age 15, the only boy in my class of 30 who did not stay on to take O levels. To celebrate my departure, I received a piece of paper stating: 'Bob has left school'! So much for my early education!

My working life began a few weeks later when I started a six-year apprenticeship as a Compositor in a printing factory. It was awful. After four and a half years I walked out. The next day I was working on a farm, as a tractor driver, I just had to be outside.

This was wonderful, and helped to increase my love and knowledge of the natural world. My Dad had a great love of nature and, with my Mum and sister we often went for very long walks in the beautiful Chiltern hills. I learned a great deal during those formative years, far more relevant and interesting than school, I thought!

One good thing that stemmed from my years in a factory, was my friendship with another young lad. We got together and cycled from Glasgow to Arrochar on Loch Long and then back down to the Lake District. My love of Scotland was immediate and the following year I was in Fort William and climbed the Ben for the first time. Further visits, further into Scotland, and even my honeymoon was spent on Skye.

Holidays were one thing, but then I got a job on Loch Lomond side as a ploughman (yes the Burns connection again!). I had the unerring ability to obtain work in places

from which I was later made redundant. From Loch Lomond it was further north and west to Loch Linnhe and Ardgour where I spent ten fantastic years as a forester/stalker - I was actually paid to go to the hills. My two wonderful children were born and they had a great childhood - without television! But for the third time redundancy was on the cards. I studied at home and gained six O levels and that opened up my way to Forvie National Nature Reserve in 1978, working for the wonderful Nature Conservancy Council. My knowledge of the natural world increased by leaps and bounds, as did my designer stubble, and I grew to look like my hero naturalist: Charles Darwin. Having moved from the west and forestry, I was a wee bit dismayed at the lack of trees here. During a conversation about this with a 'local', I was told that 'trees would not grow here'. When asked the reason, the reply left me stunned: 'Oh because there aren't any'! Such logic left me with a desire to change the situation, and when a group from Ellon Academy asked me to design and assist them with a conservation project, together we established the Forvie Tree Nursery where we grew locally native tree species from locally collected seed. More than 30 years later those beginnings had grown (like the trees) into a small business and had produced well over half a million trees, all planted throughout the northeast.

My time at Forvie brought me into contact with young people and I helped numerous schools to establish wildlife areas, thus bringing the children and the natural world together for mutual benefit. From primary school pupils to lecturing in both Robert Gordon's University and Aberdeen University, I tried to pass on my knowledge and appreciation of our amazing natural world and precious environment. Then in 1995 I found myself in northern Italy speaking to children about their wonderful environment and the need to conserve it. The friends I made there during my many repeat visits gave me the chance to achieve a life-long ambition and in 2000 they helped me to climb my first 4000m peak in the Alps - Pizzo Bernina.

This opened up a whole new chapter in my life. Further climbs in the Alps were followed by my first visit to the Himalaya in northern India. Then it was the Andes, the Southern Alps in New Zealand, more Himalaya in Nepal and the Mountains of the Moon in Africa, and of course ridges and peaks in Scotland, my first love. Seeing Chile Pine in Chile and the amazing Banksias in Tasmania, where Sir Joseph Banks had first seen them, was special. Equally special is seeing my favourite animal: a beautiful brown hare, bounding through a field here in front of my house. Mountains and wild places have always exerted a magnetic influence over me.

My feet have taken me around the world and my tent has housed me near Cape Horn at the southern tip of South America and way up into the Arctic Circle in Sweden. But Scotland is always here when I return and the highland glens and lochs are special, and always well patronised. Now my boots and my tent are pleading with me to take them 'walkies' once again and the East Coast Trail in Newfoundland beckons later this year.

BLACKDOG NEWS



There's been a lot going on here this year. The Blackdog Residents' Association (BRA) has set up gardening days within the Community. Volunteers from the village have planted over 700 flowers all over Blackdog, brightening up areas considerably. In addition, volunteers have been out and around the area tidying up areas that needed grass cut, bushes trimmed and weeds removed. A lot of effort has been made by the Community to keep areas in good order so we really thank those involved.

In addition, after applying for the Formartine Partnership Fund, Blackdog received £500 for their successful application. It was decided that this money would also be used to brighten up the village with a selection of shrubs and planters. A special mention to Colin Crombie of Hareburn Terrace who volunteered to plant and maintain a section of ground opposite number 1 - 8 Hareburn Terrace and over the last 2 years has put an incredible amount of work into this area. He has used his own time and equipment to ensure the grass is cut, flowers planted and weeds removed regularly. The result being an incredibly attractive and inviting roadside. We would like to thank Colin massively for his contributions, hard work and dedication.

Another highlight this year was the BBQ, Bouncy Castle and Beer Community day. This was a huge success. The sun was splitting the sky, the children were enjoying the bouncy castles and the sports events were enjoyed by all. Even the adults got involved in the tug of war! Thank you to all that came along and made it a great day. We are looking forward to having more Community events like these.



Following the vote to improve access to the beach, the BRA has been working hard with the relevant people to get this project off the ground. As you can imagine there are a lot of parties involved so gaining agreement from all parties is taking time. We are hopeful to see more movement on this soon - watch this space! The BRA has also met with Kirkwood Homes to understand and lobby them on the development obligations including land and funding for a community hall and grounds. Matters are now moving and building work for new Kirkwood Homes is expected to start in 2020 for new properties.

The Committee have also been working with Richard Lucas to ensure that the oil is removed from the sands to the north of the fishing station by the beach. Planning permission has been on-going and only one objection from the Council received. Once this is cleared work will begin here. The burn is still continuingly being dug out to reduce the water to gain better access to the beach.

They have also met with various Councillors and Council Officials to try and improve the bus access and route for the Village. Agreement has been reached on building a pathway to the current bus stop without having to use the new road coming into Blackdog. We are expecting this to start soon. The songs were finally completed and the beautiful tunes and lyrics reverberated around the Sand Bothy as the pupils rehearsed before performing at a whole-school assembly. Rosie and Jess from the Sand Bothy were invited to attend this and were bowled over by the beautiful songs and wonderful performance of the pupils. Teacher at Balmedie School, Mrs Judy Duncan, has been the vital link to our Bothy-School partnership and we are grateful for all her organisation and enthusiasm.

FAMILY FIRST Christmas with all the Trimmings



By the time this edition arrives on your doorsteps we will be immersed in Christmas. Wherever you look there will be scenes of children eagerly anticipating Santa; beautifully decorated houses and Christmas trees with neat piles of carefully wrapped, untouched presents; parents staring adoringly at their angelic looking children whilst in the background gentle Christmas carols will be playing, completing the Christmas card scene.

In our house however, there will be a very different scene. The children will have built themselves up into frenzy over their Christmas list; the house will be full of last minute piles of unwrapped presents (the wrapping paper most likely wrapped around the youngest whilst the elder one looks on proudly); the tree will have been rescued numerous times from toppling over, whilst the TV will have been unplugged after endless renditions of 'Last Christmas' and fights over what should be watched next.

The Christmas story and traditions are taught in schools up and down the country which means all children have some idea of the Christmas traditions in Scotland, if not the Christmas story. In our small corner of the world most people are familiar with traditions such as writing Christmas cards, putting up a tree, decorating the front door with a Christmas wreath, playing Christmas songs and buying in turkey with all the trimmings as well as mince pies and Christmas pudding.

However, only around 160 countries in the world celebrate Christmas. A few countries refer to the holiday as Family Day, including Angola and Uruguay. But one thing they all have in common is getting the family together and celebrating with a traditional dish.

One of the highlights for me at Christmas time is visiting the Christmas market where you get to have a peek into some of the traditions and foods from other countries. France is known for its Bûche de Noël, a chocolate yule log; Italy its Panettone, a cake with sugared fruits, chocolate, raisins and nuts; Germany is known for its famous Stollen cake and Australia is famous for its 'barbie' in the sunshine.

Recently I came across a Christmas tradition that occurs each year in Japan that I had never heard of before. Back in the 1970s Japan had very little in the way of Christmas traditions, so Kentucky Fried Chicken started an advertising plug called 'Kentucky for Christmas' encouraging people to buy a KFC chicken bucket for Christmas. Now about 3.6 million Japanese families eat KFC as their Christmas dinner - the chicken bucket even comes with a Christmas cake! This tradition has become so popular that families have to pre-book their food sometimes two months in advance to ensure they get it.

For most people, no matter what culture they come from, the tradition of food and drink during a festival is a highlight. One of the wonderful benefits of living in a country where there is such a variety of cultures is the opportunity to learn how others celebrate Christmas (or their own Winter festivals) and try out their traditional foods and drinks. So whether you are celebrating Christmas with a Japanese KFC or a traditional British Christmas dinner with all the trimmings, I wish you a very Merry Christmas and a healthy and happy New Year 2020.

MODERN DAY STRESS Part 3

What we want from our nervous systems is the energy to deal with our stresses and then the ability to heal and repair, ready for the next one! We want to differentiate between a work deadline and real danger and use our energy accordingly.

Our bodies and our health are our number 1 asset - are we taking care of them?



We want a healthy window of tolerance

with an even up and down line as in the picture, signifying that we can access the 'get up and go' to deal with stressors and can 'come down' again.

If our line sticks in the 'hyper' red zone we may feel angry, intolerant, anxious, overwhelmed, have racing thoughts etc.

If our line zigzags down and stays in the 'hypo' blue zone, we may feel low, antisocial, depressed, withdrawn, isolated, unmotivated, moody, flat, disinterested etc.

Our new routine:

- 1 STOP for a moment (assuming you are safe).
- 2 FEEL what is happening in your body. Feel your tummy, your neck muscles etc. Feel your body parts as they press into the ground or chair.
- 3 NOTE where the tensions are in your body. Observe your breathing, don't change it, simply be aware.
- 4 CONNECT WITH YOUR BODY. Stroke your arm, squeeze your hands. Pat your legs. You are connecting with yourself and being **in** your body.
- 5 BREATHE out gently. DON'T take deep breaths in, as that will tend to fire up your system. Longer out-breaths calm the system.
- 6 LOOK AT your surroundings look around, really look, see, smell and feel.
- 7 CHECK your body sensations. Allow yourself to cry or shout (if appropriate at the time, if not, then make time later). Holding emotions in will result in tension.
- 8 GIVE YOURSELF A HUG. Right hand on left shoulder and left hand on right upper arm. This reminds you, that you are contained in your body. It is a self-soothing technique that is used in treating PTSD and reduces overwhelm.
- 9 PUT ONE HAND ON YOUR HEART AND THE OTHER ON YOUR SOLAR PLEXUS AND REALLY FEEL. Be in touch with the real you. Having self awareness of what we do and how we do it is the first step to change and improving our health and energy.

FEELING IS HEALING: THE BODY IS BUILT TO HEAL ITSELF but WE ARE PROGRAMMED TO IGNORE OUR BODY'S MESSAGES!

Our body feels the stress first. Then, our brain kicks in and protects us from those feelings with thinking. We need to reverse this. We need to go to the body to let the stress out, as happens in nature.

We all have different capacities as is seen when two people experience the same trauma - one bounces back, the other relives it for days or years. We can be caught up in a stress that happened yesterday, last week or 20 years or more ago. If we keep adding stresses without releasing them, the system goes into overload and we see the symptoms of burnout such as chronic pain, chronic fatigue, a weakened immune system, digestive symptoms, sleep problems, depression, anxiety and more.

PARISH THREADS

When Santa's Reindeer Run out of Puff



In 1901 James McBey made his first etching. It was of Aberdeen lads fishing at the harbour. He used a waxed coated plate to draw on and a mirror to turn the view around, then shyly hid the drawing in his pocket. He used acid and a mangle to print the image at home. A couple of years later while he was working as a bank clerk in Aberdeen, he painted a beautiful oil portrait of his grandmother. He was still only 18. She is wearing a Shetland shawl over her shoulders as he recalled she routinely did, and a white cotton mutch frames her wrinkled face. I once described her in a 'Parish Threads' making mustard sauce for the winter meal of salted fish by rolling a cannon ball around in enamel bowl to crush mustard seed into a paste with milk. She looked after James in his Aberdeen lodging in the days when a man was not expected to look after himself. He went on to be a famous artist and traveller, selling an etching for a record price in 1928. His estate endowed money to Aberdeen Art Gallery for the McBey Room. Even now, the revamped Gallery which re-opened on November 2nd has had recent funding from the McBey Trust.

I showed the Balmedie Friendship Group the portrait of McBey's grandmother recently. She had lived most of her life at the Foveran Smithy not far from Belhelvie. We were talking about the experience of being a grandmother today and how much it has changed over the last generation. Some of us have to use Skype and travel through a lot of airports see them. I told the friends group, that when I was sorting out some family treasures to hand on, I had been keen to save an old-fashioned suitcase. It was the brown cardboard kind that everyone used in the fifties. The ones that fitted in the overhead rack on a train. It felt too nice to give away, so I cleaned it, looked at the 1961 newspaper lining, read the advertisements for indigestion pills and shoe polish and then had an idea. If it was set upon four legs it could be transformed into a little side table with hidden storage. I found some turned wooden legs that had been left in the shed by the previous owners of Ardo. They looked as if they had once supported the low benches in the conservatory from circa 1914.

Four of them when stripped and repainted, fitted onto the suitcase in such an elegant way, I realised I had made the perfect 'Magic Suitcase'. I shall use it when I am being Grandma Faraway. To finish up we had a grandmother quiz, and in the month when it has become illegal in Scotland to smack your child, the group had stories about being regularly punished in their schooldays with tawse and ruler. Two or three of the members remember when Christmas was not a school holiday. Hogmanay was the focus of the midwinter celebrations up to the 1920s and I see from the Craigie (Whitecairns) school records that in the Christmas week of 1901 the children attended all week... 'Wednesday was so dark that no sewing was attempted.' Reported the headmaster. Christmas hymns were practised and recited instead'. I don't think a Jolly Santa and his Reindeer would have flown over the parish in those days.

I took a stroll along the path through the Sensory Garden in Balmedie this month. The hand built raised planters are doing so well and are gradually being filled with fragrant and decorative plants. The trees planted by school children 30 years ago have grown high above providing a pleasant leafy walk.

It's the time of year for the Guisers to come out again. Who remembers guising in the old days before all the bought costumes? McBey's grandmother in her white mutch would have seen them at Foveran, young men going door to door at Hogmanay with seasonal jokes and tricks hoping to cadge a penny or two off the neighbours.

I shall wear my homemade jacket of coloured tattered rags again this Christmas in a Galoshins play. It's a short tragic comedy. Wearing paper crowns, one actor kills another in a mock sword fight and the loser is made better by a quack doctor using hoxy-croxy, the old remedy of saffron water. The actors then traditionally line up in front of the homeowners and chant rhymes hoping for silver coins. There was most likely singing and drinking involved. It's thought that it was mainly performed in the Borders but appeared as far north as Ballater in the 1890s. Probably as a result of visitors who came to be cured by the spring water at Pannanich.

I have been out and about investigating Scottish culture on your behalf. The Highland Folk Museum, at Newtonmore, was a lovely day out. I was able to see so many remnants of Scottish cultural heritage. The old schoolroom that wouldn't have surprised some of the Balmedie Friendship Group, with the strict teacher, inkwells and the desks in rows. One thing that stuck with me was that they said, one year of BBC Alba costs as much as one episode of Top Gear.

A WORD FROM THE DOC...

Looking after the Planet (and Ourselves)

We have all seen, and indeed may have been caught up in, the protests that are on-going about climate change and the potential catastrophe that awaits us. Certainly, the weather we

now experience seems to indicate that the climate is changing, with regular downpours of tropical intensity being almost the norm nowadays!

Some experts tell us that we should not be flying anywhere, should only use public transport or cycle and be vegan to save the world. All that is fine, and if you wish to, and can do these things, all well and good. However, most of us are not able to exercise that much choice, and smaller changes are probably more doable and indeed realistic. Public transport is sadly not adequate locally for it to be a viable choice for many, and it is still far cheaper to fly than take the train for longer journeys, unless you are able to book far in advance. Many would not be able to face a vegan diet but cutting down on meat and dairy is probably not such a bad thing to do, given the health as well as environmental benefits. I am aware of the apparent confusion about meat eating, with press reports making it seem that the 'expert' advice was contradictory (it wasn't, it was just individual benefit was not as great as the population benefit, the same applies for many drugs), but the reality is that the best advice is "moderation in all things, including excess"!

Another area that we can work at is to reduce the waste that we generate in our consumption society. Given that Christmas is looming again, there is an opportunity to try and waste less. Try and think about the presents we give, do we really need another 5 pairs of flash socks, or 10 handkerchiefs with funny sayings, with all the associated wrapping paper and Sellotape involved? The same applies to the vast amounts of food we order then never eat, or just eat because it is there. Think before ordering too many mince pies, trifles etc for Christmas!

I am not trying to be a killjoy, but we do need to be a little bit more sensible in how we consume, as our current lifestyle is not sustainable. It is evident that we need to try and change before we have changes imposed by nature.

This brings me onto one of my seasonal hobbyhorses, the needless double or overordering of prescriptions before the festive season. I am staggered that we all seem to believe that supplies will run out in, for this year, the 4 days extra of closure over Christmas and New Year! If you get your 'normal' 2-month supply from mid-November onwards, there is NO NEED to order again before mid-January, you will NOT run out! Also ordering 'just in case' stocks of inhalers (even though the 4 at home have lain untouched for months), paracetamol, GTN spray, laxatives or any other medicine you care to name, is hugely wasteful. This is not only in terms of the cost of the medication, but also the time spent by staff, GPs, and community pharmacy doing all this unnecessary work. Furthermore, with all this pre-Christmas ordering you'd expect that we'd do far less prescriptions in January, oh if that were so! The 'usual' orders appear as ever!

I dread to think just how much money, drugs and time is wasted with this festive mania, which happens year after year. Certainly, it must be a huge sum nationally, and there is absolutely no need for this to happen, as pharmacies are open for far longer than before, and the longest 'shutdown' is only 4 days, so please DO NOT order medication unless you need it. Scotstown patients will be politely informed that any request for double or extra 'just in case' medications, is likely to be declined!

Speaking of hobbyhorses, I do hope that you all consider ordering and eating a little bit less too. That means less to shift when you start the inevitable guilt-ridden exercise bid in January. Stay active, eat a bit less and you'll manage to avoid that trap, as well as feeling better and perhaps be a bit better off financially as well.

2019 has passed in a flash, must be Brexit, or maybe I'm just getting a bit longer in the tooth! 2020 is rapidly approaching, and we certainly cannot say that we live in boring times! So, whatever the future holds for us all, try and stay active, eat a little bit less and have a Happy Christmas and a good New Year.
