We are pleased to announce that we recently received funding from the Coastal Community Challenge Fund to purchase a new defibrillator, outdoor storage cabinet and CCTV which have now all been installed at the Football Pavilion adjacent to Eigie Close.

If you need access to the defibrillator, please dial 999 to request an ambulance and ask for the code to open the cabinet. Belhelvie Community First Responders will carry out the regular checks and maintenance on this defibrillator, just like they do to the other four units in our local area. We are hoping to arrange some CPR/defibrillator awareness sessions later in the year (assuming no more covid restrictions). This brief training session will be free of charge and open to any individual or group within the Formartine area.

Hopefully by the time you read this, our long-awaited Inclusive Play Area will have been completed. All the play equipment has arrived. We are just waiting for the contractor to give a definitive date for installation. Fingers crossed it will be available for our annual Gala on Sunday 29th May 12 - 4pm (Beachside Bar is open until 5pm). Everyone must be ready for a long-awaited community get together and our village gala is a fantastic family fun day. Events kick off at 12 noon at the Leisure Centre. This year, as well as many of our old favourites, we have some exciting new attractions:

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THE END OF AN ERA

It certainly was the end of an era on Saturday 2nd April when Potterton shop and post office closed for good. This shop has operated, under the ownership of three generations of the same family, on the corner of Panmure Gardens and the B999 for 65 years. In 1957, Pat and Henry Smith took a leap of faith, committing themselves to a mortgage to buy the shop. Henry had previously been a grocer at Whitecairns.

For the last 33 years their daughter, Marion Bruce has been in charge. However, this has not always been

Marion's occupation, as after taking her highers at Bankhead Academy, she trained as an apprentice in accountancy, studying between Aberdeen and Edinburgh, and then worked as an accountant. She took over the reins of Potterton shop, the garage and filling station 42 years ago. At this time the family also had an ice cream van at Balmedie Beach. Both Marion, and her daughter Jenny, have childhood memories of standing on an upturned crate to see over the counter!

Marion is accustomed to early 4 am starts and late nights. Her commitment to the job saw her working on her wedding day, until lunchtime when she rushed to the hairdresser, closing the shop for the rest of the day. Later, heavily pregnant, she worked right up to the day her daughter, Jenny, was born.

Malcolm Bruce, our MP of the time, fought for a new Post Office to be opened in this part of his constituency, with Potterton Post Office opening within the shop in 1989. Since then, the village has had postal services six days a week.

Marion has been delivering groceries to vulnerable people in and around Potterton for most of her life. Residents with poor health, stuck at home or anyone needing a helping hand knew they just needed to phone Marion. During the pandemic, Marion and the shop staff worked diligently to support the community. She told the newspaper deliverers to stay safely at home, meaning she and her husband, Jimmy, had to complete the delivery rounds themselves for the next few months. During storms Arwen, Malik and Corrie, she filled hot water bottles and flasks for those without power, as well as charging phones and torches for people.

Marion has decided to retire, to spend more time with her grandchildren. As always, her concern now is for those Potterton residents who needed the personal touches of the team at the Potterton Shop.

We think, that after more than 33 years of serving the community, you deserve your me-time, enjoying your family. Thank you for your loyal service to the folk in and around Potterton - you have always gone above and beyond, in your role in this wee village, seeing it as more of a vocation than a job, which you have carried out with diligence and kindness. You will certainly be missed!

Note: Potterton is to be served, as a temporary measure, by a mobile post van, on Thursday mornings between 9am and 10.30am in the car park off Panmure Gardens.

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A Community First Responder is a member of the public who volunteers to help their community by responding to medical emergencies before other help arrives. When 999 or 112 is called, a Community First Responder is sent by the emergency services whilst an ambulance is on its way.

We are delighted to announce that we now have a fifth Public Access Defibrillator (PAD) installed in our local area. The Balmedie Leisure Centre received funding from the Coastal Community Funding to have the new unit and outdoor storage cabinet installed at the Middlefield Wasps football Pavilion on Eigie Close in Balmedie. The Belhelvie Community First Responders will carry out the regular checks and maintenance on this defib just like we do with the 4 other units in our area. If you need to access the defib please dial 999 to request an ambulance and ask for the code to unlock the cabinet.

We are also thrilled that our application for funding to Arnold Clark Community Fund was successful and we received a whopping £1,000! This ensures that we can continue to buy any supplies we need for our own kit bags, buy any batteries and pads required for the PADs, and may even go towards another defibrillator - we know you can never have enough of these life-saving devices available.

We would like to say a massive thankyou to Rosie Nicol and the team at Belhelvie Community Trust who arranged and paid for our own polo shirts with logo - we now look the part when we go to call outs and any other events that we attend. Photo shows First Responders Theresa and Angela wearing their new shirts.

We had such a fun day at the Sand Bothy Easter Fun day. It was great to be able to get out our Resus Manikin (also known as



'Annie'!) and training defib again and practise using both. Thank you to everyone who had a go at our competitions. Well done to Pamela Wishart Carle and son Dylan who won the sweetie jar by guessing EXACTLY the correct answer of 105 sweets.

BLACKDOG NEWS from Blackdog Residents' Association (BRA)

The last six months have just flown by, and it has been a productive time for the village of Blackdog. Various activities have been implemented and progressed to improve village services and to enhance the environment within our community.



Our Village and Beach Tidy-Ups have continued at great pace. Having completed four clean-up activities in 2021, we have committed to completing a Tidy-Up each month in 2022. These will alternate between the village and the beach and, this year, as I write this article, we have already collected more than

forty big bags of rubbish and numerous large and unusual items that have been fly-tipped or washed up on the beach from unknown sources. The amount of waste collected continues to be a testament to the great effort by all our volunteers (some are pictured above). We would encourage anyone who would like to join us in these Tidy-Up activities to contact us through our Community Facebook page or at bigneavey@aol.com.

Our residents continue to be disappointed by the number of tree/bush guards that are scattered throughout the village, which are a by-product of the land-scaping efforts implemented when the new road routes were established. We continue in our attempts to determine who looks after the maintenance of these trees and bushes so that the village can help support them in the disposal of the guards.

By third quarter 2022 we should have a defibrillator purchased and sited within the village. We have identified an approved installation point and are currently sourcing funding to purchase the unit, cabinet and spares. This will be a vital piece of equipment within the village.

We continue working with Aberdeenshire Council to address the village's requests for improvements in the areas of safety, health and the environment. Discussions continue, regarding a new path from the tenement block to the bus stop; for appropriate waste and glass recycling bins within the village; strategically placed rest benches within the village; and support in our campaign to reduce vehicle speeding within Blackdog village. Progress has been delayed in a number of these activities, due to a lack of materials and manpower and we hope that these issues within the Council can be resolved in the short-term so that activities can continue to a positive conclusion.


Over the coming months, there will be an increase in heavy vehicles and manpower on the new slip road approaching Blackdog as Kirkwood Homes start their preliminary groundwork for the new housing project within the village. In a similar timeframe, the oil-remediation project by FCC at Blackdog Landfill will also begin its installation. This increase in activity and support trucking of materials etc., is a potential safety concern and we will be working with both Kirkwood and FCC so that they ensure that all vehicles are properly monitored and controlled throughout the operation.

We are delighted to announce that Blackdog will be holding a Gala Day this year, on Saturday 27th August. This will be an occasion that is long overdue, and the village is looking forward to having this back as an annual event for everyone to enjoy. We will be having all the usual entertainment with a BBQ, bouncy castles, face-painting, games, raffles, bottle stalls, craft stalls and so much more, so get the date in your diary!

In December 2021, the village was the delighted recipient of a Christmas tree, donated by Butterywells Farm, which became unexpectedly available after the devastation of Storm Arwen. The tree and lights display were a huge success with our residents, so much so that we plan to have a Christmas tree available, on an annual basis, to celebrate the festive season.

Finally, we continue our search to see if there is anyone in the village, or surrounding communities, who may have old newspaper cuttings/historical articles about Blackdog that we could share with the community. The aim is to generate more interest in the history of the village. FAMILY FIRST The World Around Us

Many of us might have found over the past few months that we're going through phases of keeping up with the news and then finding it too difficult to watch or listen to. Usually, the news has a mixture of good and bad stories but in the past two years, it seems to have mainly been negative: a worldwide pandemic, numerous wars, royal crisis and political turmoil. Any of these alone can be a lot for us as adults to understand never mind the children and young people in our care.

With the saturation of technology, it can be hard to shield our children from the events occurring in the world around us. A short car journey can involve news bulletins on the local radio which little ears hear; trips to the shops or takeaway often involve the presence of large screen TVs containing rolling 24 hours news; natural curiosity of children and young people can lead to playground conversations which can become exaggerated and cause distress.

And then unexpectedly our children and young people faced the reality of having to 'stay at home' for months on end whilst this unknown disease spreads around the world.

As much as we may want to shield our children from the horrors and sadness going on in the world around us, doing so may in fact be detrimental to them. What is going on around the world does impact our children's lives and as they grow and question the world around them, they begin to see their place in the world and develop their own viewpoints on issues and injustices. How can we keep them involved in current affairs in a safe way, ensuring they don't become scared of the world they live in?

The BBC Children's news programme Newsround recently celebrated its 50th anniversary in April. The creator, Blue Peter's producer Edward Barnes, said, "I wanted children to feel that our news was very much their news." He was concerned that children weren't finding out about what was going on in the world around them so wanted to create a programme in which children and young people could learn about the world around them in an age-appropriate way. So, the suited presenter behind the desk was replaced with a more casually dressed presenter who stood in front of the news desk in brightly coloured jumpers and spoke directly to young people.

Over the past 50 years Newsround became the stepping stone for many famous journalists: Krishnan Guru-Murthy who covered the war in former Yugoslavia and went on tour with a little known boyband called Take That; Julie Etchingham who won a BAFTA award and Emmy for her show on how children in Bosnia were affected by war and Lizo Mzimba who covered the 9/11 attacks, the launch of the first Harry Potter book and travelled to Iraq to report on how the war there was affecting children and young people.

The wonderful thing about Newsround is that it doesn't only cover heavy topics like war and climate change, it offers a breadth of topics such as animals and nature. In April, Martin reported the birth of an endangered monkey at Chester Zoo. Sports events and fixtures such as the World Cup, Six Nations and the Olympics are regularly featured and Newsround also provides children with the opportunity to learn about inspirational children and young people like themselves.



There is also a back catalogue of special episodes discussing issues such as periods, sexism in schools and the experience of being young, black and British. These programmes might be helpful for parents wondering how to broach sensitive subjects with their children but more importantly it provides a reliable source of information for children and young people to learn from if they have questions or interest and are doing their own research.

The 5-minute Newsround broadcast is a highlight for many children (and teachers!) in the school day but for children whose first language is British Sign Language (BSL), it's a school tradition that they have been excluded from until now. From Tuesday 19th April 2022, Newsround is going to be available online with a BSL interpreter. As one young, deaf viewer said, "I think it's really good. It means having that access and having the interpreter there makes it easier for me to access the news." *Newsround 01.04.22*

50 years ago, a dedicated news bulletin "that wasn't children's news but was news for children", (Edward Barnes), started its 6-week trial and today is continuing to evolve, ensuring all children are able to access the news. In those 5 minutes children and young people have the opportunity to be informed of what is happening in the world around them, to think about and discuss important issues and to respond to them.

Who knows, maybe the children and young people of our Parish are watching what's happening in the world around them and will go on to make the world a better place.

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OUR UNSUNG HEROES OF THE STORM

In November 2021 when Storm Arwen struck our area, some unfortunate folk were faced with a real struggle as they desperately tried to keep warm and find hot drinks and food. Freezers defrosted, house temperatures fell, and some families had to find alternative accommodation until power was restored.



The areas around Redmoss Road and Milton of Potterton, Belhelvie Lodge and Whitecairns were particularly badly affected, as fallen trees prevented reconnection to the power grid. At Milton of Potterton five power lines came down and several lines were seen hanging near Edgehill Gardens and across the B999 from Cannahars to Potterton. For those who could access the internet, Fubar (Facebook page), became a reliable source of information, gathering and posting food truck locations, road closures and updates on areas without power. Many residents held out in the hope of power being reconnected, several elected to go and stay with relatives, however for some this was not an option, and they took advantage of free hotel accommodation from SSEN (Scottish & Southern Electricity Networks).

There were many Storm Arwen unsung heroes within our communities. Here are just a few with apologies if anyone has been missed:

Thank you to Jane and Tannet Parker who, with Jim Irvine, wielded chain saws to cut back trees; Marion Bruce and staff in Potterton shop who filled flasks and hot water bottles; Gwen Pirie, who made soup and distributed it around Milton of Potterton; Jenny Nicol and Shuna Jenkins who organised a hub in Potterton Community centre offering heat, meals, food parcels, filling flasks and hot water bottles and recharging phones; the nursery staff who provided milk; the local Scout organisation who gave free access to their catering equipment, tea and coffee; Potterton shop and Jane Parker who provided food; Audrey & Willie Wright who refused to leave their home, so they could look after an elderly neighbour; Emma Forsyth of the Cake Cabin at Muirton Farm who provided bread, scones and cakes and Carol Clements from Balmedie who came to Potterton to offer her services. Thanks, must also go to our local First Responders, who were on standby to help if required; Bill Murray and the staff at Balmedie Leisure centre, who provided not only a warm space but hot food and drinks, hot showers; The Coffee Apothecary (Pitmedden) who offered half price meals to those without power. We are grateful to the Brownie Leaders for their understanding when the Community Centre could not be used for their group. A big thank you also goes to Camille Russell (Live Life Aberdeenshire) and Reece Ironside (Aberdeenshire Council) for enabling the use of Potterton Community Centre, and to Councillors Hassan, Johnston and Powell who gave their support. Finally, we also need to thank the engineers from SSEN who worked tirelessly to reconnect homes. Thank you everyone!

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
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BRIDAL PACKAGES AVAILABLE

A WORD FROM THE DOC...

Resilience

Little did I think that the next time that I had to consider a Banter article, we would be looking at a war in Europe and facing a perfect storm of financial woes. The NHS is still staggering along,

a bit like a drunk wandering home after a good night out, but at least it is making slow progress and is still upright. We are still woefully short of GPs and nursing staff in primary care, but we carry on, maybe not that calmly at times! So how do staff manage to do this? The ability to cope, adjust, be flexible and focus on the things we can control, helps staff manage. In short, there is remarkable resilience being shown by people throughout the country. This has meant that there has not been a collapse in services, but things have been sorely stretched.

As a GP I am aware that for patients, who are facing problems on a personal level, resilience does vary. Some people struggle to adjust to what others consider to be a little blip, and others seem to take significant problems and serious illness 'in their stride'. This variability is well known, and there are factors which help you have better resilience and some which undermine it too.

Having a supportive group of family and friends is important, as is having a job security and not having to worry about being able to afford things. Many are lucky to have this, but some don't and despite this, they still cope. Being isolated, not having support, facing economic hardship or job insecurity begins to erode resilience and it becomes harder to maintain with such problems. You can still struggle despite having apparent advantages and even if you do have some disadvantages, you can take steps to help your resilience. It is important to be aware of how you can nurture your resilience, as I fear we are all in for a testing time.

Unbelievably, there have been some useful gains from the pandemic. One has been an increase in the information about resilience available online, in the general media and better awareness of how important this quality is. NHS Inform is a good place to start when looking for information about this or other health concerns.

To make a start, you can try to appreciate the 'simple' things in life, such as taking time to enjoy a sunset, having a cuppa with friends or family, looking at birds feeding in the garden or taking note of how nature changes as the seasons pass. Personally, I find that walking our family dog is very helpful.

Volunteering is also good for you, this brings you into contact with others, and helps your wellbeing too. I suggest that you get in touch with the Belhelvie Community Trust to see how you can help at the various groups affiliated to the BCT, thereby helping your personal and community resilience.

This may all sound a bit trite, but these things do help ground you and gain a sense of perspective which is part of maintaining and developing resilience.

Once you have some perspective you are more able to realise that there are some things that are beyond your control, so there is little or no value in spending too much time and emotional energy worrying about these factors.


Identifying what you can affect and perhaps change also helps build your resilience. You need to develop a degree of flexibility which helps you adjust and adapt to changing situations. Some people do this more easily than others and it helps them cope with life changing diagnoses or sudden changes in personal circumstances. However, you can practice and develop resilience skills too.

This may sound daunting, and some may think that I am stating the obvious, but resilience is an important quality to be aware of and try to develop. Please do not think that I will pass up the opportunity to emphasise other aspects of resilience, such as staying healthy by keeping up your exercise and sensible eating. Maintaining good habits in these areas also feeds into more general resilience and are worth the effort, so stay active!

A final word, about Covid and Influenza jabs. Please DO NOT ask your GPs about them, as we are no longer involved. You will receive letters inviting you for your Covid boosters and flu jabs in due course. If you think you have been missed, please contact the Health Board or look up the telephone number on NHS Inform.

Take care and stay active, practise your resilience and have a good spring and summer.

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
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BREATHE YOUR WAY TO BETTER HEALTH



We all take breathing for granted but it is a wonderfully powerful tool that we can use to help us modulate our health and mood. Our breathing is our powerhouse and vital for everything we do. In these times, with very frightening information coming from the media and government, we need to look after ourselves! It seems they, and the medical services, have forgotten that stress exacerbates everything. It also affects the immune system - so it really is time to do what we can to stay healthy.

Our inner self is so important, and we can influence it with our breathing, thoughts (switch off the news), being more in touch with ourselves, taking time just to BE, eating fresh food or food with as few preservatives as possible, drinking unpolluted water and being in touch with nature and, in this area, who doesn't want to beach-walk?

Calmer states mean that we can digest our food better, cope with stressful events and sleep better. All this helps the rest and digest part of our system - the essential part that enables healing. Other techniques can be used to give us energy - the easiest way is to monitor how we feel inside (joy, sadness, fear, excitement, anxiety) and how our bodies feel (tight, in pain, 'not right', diarrhoea, coughing).

Our breathing habits often interfere with how we cope with a stressful situation. Have you ever gasped with shock or amazement? Have you ever concentrated so much on something so hard, that you have hardly breathed at all? Have you ever rushed and become 'out of breath' or exercised to the point of very fast breathing or even 'being out of breath'? What about feeling upset - what happens to your breathing?

Becoming more aware of our breathing will help us to manage our life and health - physical, mental, emotional and spiritual. Our immune system will be grateful.

Get in touch with how you are breathing now. Place one hand on your heart and the other on your belly. Is the lower hand rising? In an ideal world, we want to feel a rising of the belly as we breathe.

Think of something exciting that you did, then think of a sadness - did your breath change?

Our mood governs our breathing, so we tend to sigh more when we are sad, and our breathing rate increases when we are excited. Indeed, when we are anxious and worried, we will probably only breathe using the upper chest. This is not an efficient way to breathe as we are not oxygenating our bodies to the max. Sitting for long periods slouched in front of a computer encourages this form of breathing. The main breathing muscle is the diaphragm which separates the abdomen from the chest. Its electrical supply comes from the neck. It acts like bellows drawing air in.

Massaging your tummy and under your ribs will help calm you, especially for sleep.

Therapists' hands-on approaches help to relax the diaphragm and increase the space in the ribcage. Working on the ribs and back stimulates the rib/intercostal muscles which give the information to the diaphragm. Relaxing effects of massage are another.

Massaging your own face is always beneficial and the muscles of the face (and tongue) are linked to the vagus/relaxing/rest and repair nerve.

There are many self-help techniques that are easy and fun. We really want to use the amazing diaphragm to its full capacity. Important blood vessels and the eating tube pass through it so it is also involved in the circulation and digestive processes with its pumping and sucking effects.

Start the day with a stretch of the arms overhead. Then place your hands just below your ribcage. Always begin by breathing out to calm your system.

Take a deep breath in, then take longer to breathe out. At the same time, press your fingers in, under the ribs and take another breath keeping the pressure on.

As you breathe out for the second time, allow your fingers to press in and up a little more.



Repeat one more time.

Then stretch your arms overhead and lean back a little to look at the sky.

Just being more in tune with your body is really the message here. Our bodies store all the stresses, traumas, accidents, upsets, adventures, and excitements that we have had. Pain is often the body's way of telling you that it wants to heal a past event. Coughing after this, is OK! You will be moving secretions around. Obviously, take advice before doing this if you already have heart problems or difficulties with breathing.

Alternate nostril breathing helps us relax, lowering stress levels with knock-on effects on the cardiovascular system. It will help you get to sleep, reduces anxiety and promotes an overall feeling of wellness. It has been noted that athletes who have used this technique regularly find they have increased endurance.

- 1. Close the left nostril with your finger and breathe in to the right one.
- 2. Close that right one with your finger for 3 seconds.
- 3. Slowly breathe out through the other left nostril.
- 4. Breathe in through the left nostril.
- 5. Close it with your finger, hold for three seconds.
- 6. Breathe out through the right.
- 7. Repeat for a few minutes.

Touch therapies help to goad the body's own pharmacy into action and allow the body to heal itself. Osteopathy and Remedial Massage maintain or restore better structure and thus, a better functioning respiratory system. Reflexology allows the lungs to be worked through the feet! All this is non-invasive so definitely worth a try. Breathe in light, love and healing to your precious body and be grateful for every breath.

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AN UNFORGOTTEN WHITECAIRNS FARMER When good neighbours become good friends

I was driving past Parkseat on the Ardo Road recently and noticed a beautifully built cairn on a hill. I walked up to have a look but there was nothing to indicate why it was there.

I knew it was on land once owned by the late Alistair King, one of the last crofting farmers in the area, and could see someone had begun to renovate his now semiderelict cottage. Nothing ventured etc, so^{1} wrote a letter asking about the cairn and



put it through the door - without much hope of receiving a reply. The following day an email arrived from Gavin Drummond, the now owner of Parkseat and Alistair's cottage. He told me he met Alistair in 2002 when he and his partner bought the ruin that was Parkseat house. They intended to rebuild it and make it their home. At the time, Alistair was still working the croft.

To get to Parkseat, Gavin had to pass Alistair's cottage and, over the years, on the way back from work, would often stop for a chat - and anyone who knew Alistair knows that his 'chats' could go on for a long time.

Sadly, in 2013, Alistair got cancer and soon was unable to look after himself. Determined that he would not spend his last days in a Home, he hatched a plan with Gavin to enable him to remain in his beloved Whitecairns cottage. Gavin, his family, and several carers made this possible for him. Alistair died in 2015. He had no living relatives.

Gavin decided to collect together the small number of belongings left by Alistair - his watch, knick-knacks and even the flying ducks from his living room - and put them in a capsule along with his old photographs of long-forgotten folks. This was buried at the highest point on the farm. Above it, Gavin built a cairn in Alistair's memory because, as he says, "A friendship with a neighbour and the realisation that without anybody to put something in place, then that whole life just fades away." By the cairn there is a plaque with the inscription:

"Underneath this pile of stones Lies neither gold nor ash nor bones It simply marks a place of highest spot Simply so one old farmer is not forgot.

In memory of Alistair Clark King, a lifelong farmer of Whitecairns. This was his battlefield."

100 YEARS OF SCOUTING IN BELHELVIE PARISH

Scouts were first registered in Belhelvie Parish late in November 1921 and the first recording of a Leader and Scouts was in January 1922.

The Scoutmaster was W. Murison of The Police Station, Balmedie and there were 13 Scouts that first year. The following year, 1923, there were 17 Scouts and 2 leaders, the

Scoutmaster now being J.H. Loutit of Ardo House. 1924 was a popular year as there were now 28 Scouts, 14 Wolf Cubs and 5 leaders. The Scoutmaster was A.W. Ross, Schoolhouse, Balmedie and the Cub Mistress was Miss M. Mavor, c/o Mair, Stirling Hillock, Whitecairns. Our story continues until 1931 which seems to be the last year of our early history with 16 Scouts only and the Scoutmaster on his own was Rev. J.E.S. Otty of Belhelvie South Church Manse (Potterton). Then nothing for forty years. Our next appearance was in 1972 and we've been continuous since.

The black and white photo below is of Scouts circa 1925 at Balmedie Beach, and is from the James Morrison collection which was rediscovered several years ago behind a bricked-up door in a cottage at Stoneyards, Menie. Note the bell tents, the hand cart that was a fixture of early Scouting, and the water boiler on the open fire.

Better Balmedie has been back working for some months now. Following the destruction of Storm Arwen, we used our chainsaw to clear six paths around the woods by the football

pitches. Many of the tree trunks have been chopped into logs and are now available for £3 a bag (to raise funds for our group).

The sloped planter at the south entrance to the village was beginning to rot so we have replaced this with ground-level perennial plants. The council was unable to give us bedding plants this year so we have gone with perennials.

Due to a rotting spar, the owl in the boat display at the library was detached during a recent storm. Further inspection indicated weathering damage to the boat so we decided to look for a fibreglass replacement which requires less maintenance. This has been sourced in Newburgh and now we need to transport this to Balmedie. We have been busy. We have repaired and replaced the damaged finger post sign beside the library. Picnic tables (accommodating wheelchair users) have been put together and fixed in place in the Sensory Garden. A bench has also been placed on the footpath leading up to Belhelvie Church. We have also cleared the weeds and fallen debris from the footpath at the Eigie Road playpark.



We are looking after the new Christmas tree we have planted at the Wee Kirk. A greenhouse that we managed to salvage after it blew away, is now permanently fixed and is full of seed trays. And our bowser is now fixed with a new tyre in time for the growing season, to go round the village watering our many plant displays.


The crocus displays in the village were exceptional this year as were the daffodil displays which have thickened up over the years.

Yes, as a Church, we are open again. Still keeping distance and wearing masks, but we do now manage a cuppa at the church service. Numbers are not yet back to pre-Covid, but it would be good to welcome you any Sunday.

Our Church and our sister Churches supported a project in Malawi, a water pump, to help a village improve its harvests. We are waiting to hear about the next project. We are small and we cannot change the world, but hopefully we can make the world of a difference to some.

But of course, this country is beginning to feel the financial consequences of Covid and the war in Ukraine. I am sure we are all asking, 'Who allowed the UK / Europe / the West to become reliant on Russia and China for our energy and wheat?'

It seems incredible that we find ourselves in the pockets of dictators. For good reasons, we closed down our oil production, we pay farmers to take land out of agricultural use, then find we have shortages! We need to pray for wisdom for our leaders. In today's financial crisis, if you know of people struggling, let us know, so we can try and help.



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BIODIVERSITY

Why Encouraging a Child's Sense of Wonder is So Important



Rest assured our planet is in no danger. Despite careless use of language and barring some unforeseeable and cosmic catastrophe, the planet will still be here for many hundreds of millions of years. What is less certain is the future health and diversity of life on our world, all of which is interdependent, and the different habitats it occupies. Over-population, economic development and technology are all

putting pressure on the natural world. The result is a well-documented catalogue of plant and animal extinctions and a loss of the diversity that healthy ecosystems depend on. We can see this for ourselves. Fewer insects and birds in the sky, fewer fish in our rivers. When was the last time you saw a once-common hedgehog in your garden?

A significant contributor to environmental damage and loss of biodiversity is a lack of understanding that inevitably stems from our disengagement from nature. Children spend less time exploring nature, fewer adults live and work in a natural environment and our appreciation and awareness of nature diminishes. Improving our appreciation of natural ecosystems is essential if there is to be any hope of stopping or reversing the current environmental damage.

So, what is biodiversity?

Biodiversity is simply all the different kinds of life that occur naturally in a particular habitat - the variety of animals, plants, fungi, and even microorganisms like bacteria that make up our natural world. Each of these species and organisms work together in ecosystems, like an intricate web, to maintain balance and support life. When you lose or destroy some of these species, the entire ecosystem suffers and remaining species also come under threat.

Ultimately, human society also depends on healthy ecosystems. The food we eat, the water we drink and the air we breathe, the natural beauty around us, all depend on a balanced ecosystem. The UK is one of the world's most nature-depleted countries, in the bottom 10% globally and last among the G7 group of nations. It has an average of about half its biodiversity left, far below the global average of 75%. This makes it vital that we encourage future generations to learn how nature functions around them and to understand the importance of caring for our local environment.

Educating our children about biodiversity and the natural world

There are lots of opportunities for children of all ages to get involved and a wealth of materials and information is available for parents and schools alike.

Banter Minibeast Hunt

A great activity to do outdoors with nursery and primary-aged children is a minibeast hunt. It's great fun, and children can be very engaged with it, and it can be used to teach curriculum! Observation is one of the key skills for scientists. Being able to observe the world around you, use your senses to experience it, and record what you

observe are key skills for all types of scientists, but also important skills for lots of other professions including art.

Curiosity is an essential element of good scientists. Constantly wanting to ask "why?", "what?" and "how?" shows a desire to understand the world around us. Minibeasts are all around us, and yet their microhabitats can seem like whole new alien worlds. Giving children the chance to examine these habitats closely gives them an opportunity for lots of new questions. Why does a particular minibeast live where it does? What does it eat? How does it move? Why doesn't it get eaten? This can develop analytical and connective thinking.

So why not take your Banter out with the little ones and complete your own Minibeast hunt to see how many you can find! A fun activity that can be adapted for all ages! More info can be found at www.woodlandtrust.org.uk
