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#### THE BLACKDOG SANDS OF TIME

Beachcombing is great fun, and you can always be surprised as to what the sands can unveil as you walk along the endless beaches on the Aberdeenshire coast.

Blackdog beach is no exception and during the last 12 months a feast of wildlife has been spotted on the beaches from starfishes to squid; an interesting range of jellyfish and shellfish; a wide variety of seabirds and the unusual occurrence of a sea mouse. Sea mice are foragers that dwell on the sea-bed - they are not a common find on our beaches but during storms they can be lifted off the seabed by the tides and if you are lucky you can get to see one on the beach.



However, over the last six months, Blackdog Beach has unveiled some of its history which has had people from near and far come down to the village to investigate.

In the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter of 2022, the sands were at their lowest point for many years and the concrete barriers, sited in World War II to repel invading tanks, offloaded from boats offshore, were more noticeable than any villager can ever remember.

Around the same time, the low-level sands revealed a mine from the war and, during the days after it was found and reported, it was kept under the watchful eye of the police and coastguard before given the all-clear by the MoD as being of no danger to the public. The moving sands have now buried the mine again so those people who were able to get down to the beach to see it were fortunate. Unfortunately, not so lucky were the people who laid the mines during the war, and there are records kept of soldiers maimed or killed outright whilst doing their duties and installing the mines. In WWII, the beaches near Blackdog were mined in response to fears of a German invasion, resulting in several fatalities. 10 March 1941 at North Beaches of Blackdog, Sapper Leslie Alfred Whitney - Royal Engineers (age 23) when a "toadstool" he was arming detonated. 17 March 1941 at Millden Links, Corporal Charles Crowe - Gordon Highlanders (age 24) and on 18 March 1941 at Millden Links, Private Colin Innes - Gordon Highlanders (age 22) were all killed by landmines. The minefields were cleared in 1944.

No sooner had the mine been sighted and dealt with when we had another object of interest uncovered close to the Blackdog Burn - on this occasion it was a boat wreck! Not sure what the name or size of the vessel was but it had its original rivets/bolts and anchor port still visible. It was reported to Aberdeen Maritime Museum, but little interest was shown, and the sands of time have covered up the wreck once more!



Last but not least, in March this year, a WWII automatic gun position (Pill Box) just appeared out of the eroding sand dunes... one day there was nothing, the next day there it was!

The historical fixture attracted newspaper and TV reporters, and since then many visitors have come to the village just to see this outpost which is now likely to be a permanent visible fixture on Blackdog Beach.



Never underestimate the interesting discoveries you can find when exploring the beaches around the Aberdeenshire coastline - at Blackdog we are just waiting in anticipation for the next revelation to be uncovered.

#### **HAVE YOUR SAY!**

#### **BCT - COMMUNITY CONSULTATION**

Since its creation in 2015, Belhelvie Community Trust has attempted to improve community facilities for residents of Belhelvie parish and visitors from further afield. We have restored and opened the derelict

Sand Bothy, created Balmedie Beach Wheelchairs, installed a Changing Places disabled toilet and inclusive play equipment, all in Balmedie Country Park; created a sensory garden in Balmedie and managed a successful flood prevention project in Potterton, which has led on to the formation of Potterton Volunteers. We have also provided information and support where possible to other groups and organisations throughout the parish and established links with Balmedie Primary School and local uniformed organisations.

It is some time since the people who live in Belhelvie Parish were consulted about community facilities in a comprehensive way - Balmedie Views in 2009 and the Potterton, Blackdog and Belhelvie report a few years later.

This consultation therefore will give you a chance in 2023 to tell us what you would like to see in your community. Some provision already exists, so you can let us know whether you are happy with these facilities, or whether you would like improvements or expansion. Some provision doesn't exist at all, so please let us know where the gaps are in services for you, your family and your neighbours.

The consultation also gives us a chance to ask what you are able to contribute as a volunteer in your communities. As local authority budgets are reduced, we are being told that we will need to do more in our communities.

The consultation is not going to produce all the answers, but it does give us the chance to gather information, opinions and ideas from you. We can then share that information with the authorities and discuss with them how we can all work together to improve facilities in our communities.

We hope you will take the opportunity to complete the questionnaire and continue to support us, your local charity, to make things a bit better throughout the parish of Belhelvie. (Belhelvie Community Trust is a charity registered in Scotland SC045563.)

The questionnaire will go on line on May 10<sup>th</sup> 2023. You can find it on Belhelvie Community Trust website and Facebook page. We are aware though that not everyone uses the internet so we will have paper copies available if you would prefer to answer that way. We are also planning a consultation event in June at Balmedie Library and you can also contact us at The Sand Bothy on 07752 768918 or <u>info@belhelviecommunitytrust.org.uk</u>.

We know that there are gaps and flaws in community provision, but we hope that if we can make constructive comments and work with the authorities, then change can come.

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#### FASD - THE HIDDEN DISABILITY

Have you ever heard of FASD (Foetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder)? It's the most common Neurological Developmental Condition in Scotland and the Western World - and did you know that it is 4 times more common than Autism? But it is a preventable condition. The government estimates 1 in 20 people in Scotland have the condition, but research indicates the number is much higher. There is growing evidence that many of those diagnosed with ADHD and/or Autism may actually have FASD.

FASD occurs when a growing baby is exposed to alcohol during pregnancy but because the developing baby doesn't have a functioning liver it can't process the alcohol so it's toxic to the baby. The frequency and levels of exposure to alcohol during pregnancy will dictate the impact of damage to the developing baby's brain and organs. There is no safe amount as everyone has different genetics and it's like playing Russian Roulette.

Unlike ADHD and Autism, FASD impacts more than just the brain, it also impacts organs including the heart, kidneys and commonly hearing and sight. Many with FASD will also have sensory issues, sleep problems, behavioral and learning problems. Misdiagnosis is extremely common as FASD mimics many of the symptoms of ADHD and Autism. Those with FASD will not receive the additional support they need if they are labelled ADHD or Autistic. This can lead to secondary mental health issues.

The misconceptions around FASD are that it only affects children in the care system and families with chaotic lives and problems with alcohol. This isn't the case. Ask any pregnant mum when they found out they were pregnant and unless they are doing IVF, they probably knew from around 6 weeks or even later. 1 In 4 pregnancies are unplanned. Some women, after a hard day's work, have a glass of wine to relax and then another with their meal then another watching TV. This is actually classed as binge drinking. As a society, drinking is very much part of our everyday culture now. If you don't find out you're pregnant until you're 3 or 4 months along, then the damage could already be done. How many women carry on their pre-pregnancy lifestyle which often includes alcohol, or they just cut down a little but don't stop?

The advice from the Chief Medical Advisor is "to minimise the risk, the safest thing to do during pregnancy is to not drink alcohol". The risk occurs because the alcohol passes straight through the bloodstream, through the placenta straight to the developing baby. The alcohol level is the same for the baby, it's not diluted.

So, the reality is that in every classroom there is at least one child with FASD, there will be more but due to non-disclosure to the Midwives, GP, or Health Visitor about drinking alcohol in pregnancy there's no record. If there is no record of alcohol exposure in pregnancy those children will be misdiagnosed.

This happens due to stigma, due to lack of awareness and education, but nobody should beat themselves up over something they didn't know. It's the responsibility of everyone to get the message out there that an alcohol-free pregnancy is the safest way to protect the developing baby.

Often a diagnosis of ADHD or Autism is more 'acceptable' to parents, particularly birth parents as it's hard to acknowledge that prebirth alcohol exposure may have been a contributing factor to their child's difficulties. Due to the damage caused by alcohol exposure, those with FASD struggle throughout their lives with impulse control, they don't understand the concept of cause and effect and they struggle with social cues. If the correct support and interventions are not put in place early on in life, a high number of people with FASD become involved in the criminal justice system. There can also be mental health difficulties.

If, after reading this article, you are wondering who I am? I am someone with first-hand experience of living with FASD. I, like most of you, never knew the damage it can cause to a developing baby. Misinformation and lack of awareness has made me passionate about spreading the word on a preventable condition, hence this article in Banter. On a positive note, those that are successfully diagnosed early and receive the correct support do go on to lead very happy successful lives.

#### BLACKDOG NEWS from Blackdog Residents' Association (BRA)

Another six months have passed since our last contribution to the Banter, and our residents and volunteers have continued to be involved in activities that have improved the surrounding environment within our community.

We were delighted to announce that we met our target for 2022 with regards to our Village and Beach Tidy-Ups, having completed at least one Tidy-Up each month in the year. These activities continue to have such a positive impact on removing waste and litter from the grass verges, communal land and the beach area at Blackdog. Our volunteers (some are seen in the photo on the right) have



collected over 150 large bags of rubbish in 2022 along with large volumes of other waste types. We will continue to encourage more volunteers to take part in these activities throughout 2023.

As we venture out from Winter, we look to address the green areas and planters within the village over the Spring and Summer months. We have already acquired several sapling trees that will be planted within the village and those, along with the herbaceous perennials and annual bedding plants donated by the Council, will once again have the village 'blooming'! Our thanks go to all our volunteers that take part in this activity and to Aberdeenshire Council for their generous donation of plants. We have also decided that we may supplement these donations by purchasing additional plants from funds raised in 2022.

In December we held a couple of events in the village - a Christmas get-together in the Community Park with the switching on of the Christmas tree lights and an official Christmas Raffle. For the Christmas get-together, we were very grateful to have had a tree donated by Sharon and Graham from Butterywells Farm and the children from the village took part in a tea-light procession in the park, culminating in three young volunteers helping to turn on the tree lights. Mulled wine, hot chocolate and snack food was made available and with a couple of cheeky elves handing out selection boxes and glow sticks to the children, everyone had a great time. Entertainment was provided by a troupe of singers from Ellon (Local Vocals) and everyone joined in a great selection of festive songs. Again, thanks to all our volunteers who made the event such a success.

We also held a licensed Christmas Raffle in December to raise funds for our community projects with a Public Draw taking place on the 17<sup>th</sup> December in the Community Park. Out of 3,000 tickets printed we sold over 2,600 which was an excellent achievement as we gave ourselves less than 5 weeks to sell them! We cannot thank everyone enough for their generous contributions to the raffle with a special mention to Augean North Sea Services, Trump International and Murcar Golf Club for supplying some of the top prizes.

We have several Council-led projects underway (or about to get underway) for the village, which are at various stages of maturity. A project to build a lit pathway from Strabathie Cottages to the Blackdog bus stop has progressed well and, at the time of writing this article, is now in its final stages of completion. This path will considerably reduce the time it takes to walk to the bus stop from the centre of the village.

The Council have engaged architectural consultants to work with our community to develop proposals to get to a detailed design stage for a Council supported Community Facility in Blackdog. To date, we have had three workshops with the consultants; a Council-led survey circulated to all our residents for their feedback as



to what they would want from this facility; and an Open Day in our Community Park (pictured above) where our residents had the opportunity to meet with and discuss the project with the architects. The process has now reached the stage where a briefing report and initial proposals will be presented to Council members. Whilst we understand that this will be a long process everyone is heartened by the initial progress to date.



The new Kirkwood housing development in Blackdog is progressing vigorously with houses popping up at a steady rate and it will be interesting to see how fast these are populated with the current economic climate. At the same time, the oil-remediation project led by FCC at Blackdog Landfill site has also moved forward and in the coming weeks they will be laying a pipeline through the landfill site to recover the oil that has been seeping from the site to the beach. The community will continue to monitor

these activities to ensure that no safety concerns develop due to the increase in construction traffic carrying materials into the area.

We have at last completed the topography survey for the project to build a bridge over Blackdog burn (in photograph to the left) which will reinstate an easier access route to the beach. This survey is the initial stage of the process and 2023 will be an important year in determining whether this project will be viable in providing all-people access to Blackdog Beach. Finally, the 2023 Blackdog Gala date has been agreed - Saturday 19<sup>th</sup> August, so please put this in your diaries. We look forward to seeing you at the fun day at Blackdog Community Park.

**Councillor Andrew Hassan shares some news:** 



It's been another busy few months for your elected members since my last update. One of our highlights was the regular visit to the Ward from the Chief Executive Jim Savege in February. He, Cllr Nicol and I had valuable conversations with the Belhelvie Community Trust at The Sand Bothy (pictured) on their various projects - and with Alan Neave of the Blackdog Residents Association on the importance of delivering on 'placemaking' for the village.

Formartine Area Committee has met a further three times. In January, Committee agreed the award of a contract for the construction of the long-awaited footpath at Blackdog between the village and the A90/A92 bus stops. At the next meeting in February, we had a procurement approval for Phase 2 of the affordable housing project (Strabathie Village) also at Blackdog. This was a welcome report, advising of the properties for social rent, mixed sized homes - all of which will be energy efficient helping to address fuel poverty.

Finally, at the March meeting we were presented with the Masterplan for the future planned Potterton Development which we deferred consideration of for a site visit which will take place following the Council's Easter recess. The other notable item at that meeting saw Councillors agree a 'Formartine Recognition Scheme' - following which Councillors can make suggestions of individuals or groups who have contributed significantly to their community and after a consideration process such nominees would be considered by Committee and thereafter presented with a certificate at an appropriate time.

Residents will have also heard of the issues of schooling locally. A re-zoning Public Consultation took place which proposed re-zoning the whole of Blackdog into Aberdeenshire - with a public event held back on the 10<sup>th</sup> November. Since then, much discussion has been had on exactly where to build the "next school" to address rising pupil numbers across the two parishes immediately north of the Aberdeen City boundary. At Education and Children's Services Committee on the 2<sup>nd</sup> February following a vote, a decision has been taken to pursue an option at Foveran to replace the very small school there as the immediate priority.

Finally, Milton of Potterton residents are aware that all four local Councillors have been working to secure a committee discussion on the matter of HGV lorries utilising the rural road network, and the change of frequency of this locally since the AWPR completion. All four Ward Councillors have submitted a joint request for a committee discussion on the subject, which we anticipate at one of the May Formartine Area Committee meetings. If our colleagues agree this is an issue to be addressed, it would be referred to a future Infrastructure Services Committee meeting.

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### **DEFIBRILLATORS SAVE LIVES**



If you see someone having a cardiac arrest, call 999, start CPR and get someone to find a defibrillator.

Public-access defibrillators are situated across our Parish. At present, there are six of them, but the hope is that this number will increase through fund-raising and sponsorship.

Each external storage box is yellow with a light on inside it. Call 999 for the code then turn the handle to open. There are clear instructions.

In Belhelvie Parish, defibrillators can be found at:

#### **BELHELVIE - CADGERS GARAGE**

Cadgers Garage is on the right-hand side of the B977 (approximately 100 yards from the junction) as you head out of Belhelvie village. The unit is located at the MOT car parking area which is visible from the street. As you look at the garage from the street, the unit is on the wall on the right-hand side.

#### **POTTERTON - COMMUNITY CENTRE**

The unit is located on the right-hand side of the main entrance to the Potterton Community Centre.

#### THE SAND BOTHY AT BALMEDIE COUNTRY PARK

The unit is located on the outside of the Sand Bothy building. It is on the wall facing the road (opposite side to the beach) and can be seen from the road and car park.

#### **BALMEDIE - FOOTBALL PAVILION**

The unit is located at the Middlefield Wasps Football Pavilion.

#### **BALMEDIE - LEISURE CENTRE**

The unit is located on the left-hand side of the Leisure Centre's main entrance to the building.

#### **BLACKDOG - ARCHER MARKETING BUILDING**

As you drive into the village along Hareburn Terrace, the Archer Marketing building is on the right, directly across from the play park and Banbury Cross Nursery. The unit is on the left-hand side of the building.



### **SPIKKIN' VIKING**

Though Scots have long thought of themselves as unique, millions of us betray our international heritage every time we open our mouths. In the Scots dialect, including Doric, there are hundreds of words of Scandinavian origin which we use daily without realising it.

Viking seafarers launched their first raids on Scotland in the late eighth century, with Nordic influence continuing well into the 12th century. And 900 years later, we are still using a rich variety of words they brought to our shores, like bairn (child), midden (dump) and muckle (large/a lot).

For centuries there were political, cultural, and consequently linguistic links across the North Sea. The first Viking raid on Iona is thought to have taken place in 794. Much of the Hebrides and Caithness also came under Norse rule. Orkney and Shetland continued to be earldoms under Norway until 1468, which resulted in the Scandinavian-derived Norn language being spoken on Orkney and Shetland until the 18th century, influencing the Shetlandic and Orcadian dialects to this day. And with the Vikings also invading the mainland in great numbers, present-day Scotland has been left with a spoken language rich in Scandinavian influence. Here are just a few similarities:

While there are some logical explanations behind the similarities, a complicated mix of factors over time led Scots and their Nordic cousins to use similar words.

Old English and Old Norse are themselves related, having a common ancestor like other Germanic languages. The medieval kingdom of Northumbria extended as far north as the Firth of Forth in the ninth century. So the Northumbrian dialect would have been spoken in what is now south-east Scotland. And Scots is consequently closest to that dialect. Northumbrian in turn was influenced by Old Norse because of the Scandinavian settlement there. The kingdom of Northumbria was ruled by Scandinavian kings from the mid-ninth century. So, it's likely that usage and pronunciation of common words in that area were influenced and reinforced by Norse usage.

To cut a long story short, we have two related languages - Old English and Old Norse - coming into contact in Northumbria, and in Orkney and the Western Isles, where the usage of Old Norse influences Old English speakers, in terms of both vocabulary and pronunciation. This developed into Scots, with many similarities in northern English dialects.

Our place names also betray a Scandinavian influence. For example, Stornoway is an anglicised adaption of the Old Norse, stjarna (star) and vágr (bay). And it would be hard to concoct a more Viking-sounding place name than Wick. Its root is derived from the Old Norse word vik (small creek/inlet) and is used to describe the raiders themselves. Lerwick and Uig also share the same origin. Then there's Dingwall (assembly field/meeting place) and Kirkwall (church's bay).

In recognition of the strong cultural ties with our cousins across the North Sea, journalist Lesley Riddoch set up the think tank Nordic Horizons in 2010. Their aim is to push for closer links between Scotland and its northern neighbours. She said: "It's like two cousins who have gone their own ways. Only one of them still has his own hair, but they're still cousins. In many ways, Scotland is the southern, fertile end of the Nordic empire."

It is perhaps unsurprising that certain parts of Scotland feel as Scandinavian as they do British. Jo Grimond, former Liberal MP for Orkney and Shetland was asked to give the name of his nearest train station on a parliamentary expenses form. He wrote: "Bergen, Norway".

### SLEEPING IS SOMETHING THOSE WHO ARE GOOD AT IT, TAKE FOR GRANTED

**Sleep is a gift - to our body, mind and emotions.** It is the time to regenerate and heal not only the physical but also the mental and emotional. I am sure you have had a time when you didn't sleep

well and the effects it had, so I won't list them here but, as we know, when we are irritable and have difficulty concentrating, it affects all around us - and our health. The way you feel in the morning is a good indication of sleep quality.

Pain frequently interferes with sleep. Osteopathy, massage, and other bodywork help the body to produce more pain-relieving chemicals. A good posture is important not only for work and play but also for sleeping. If we have spinal misalignments, they can affect us when we curl up in our favourite position. 'Stuck' bits and muscle spasm may affect how we lie and make relaxing almost impossible. Realigning the spine reduces imbalances. Improving the structure of the body makes it more efficient for everything, including sleep. In a past article, we discussed how adjusting spinal restrictions and improving posture, can help breathing. An important part of this was the ability to relax. Breathing is an important tool in relaxation and sleep management.

Why not get in touch with how you are breathing now? Place one hand on your heart and the other on your belly. Is the lower hand rising? In an ideal world, we want to feel a rising of the belly as we breathe.

Massage helps to relieve tensions. This improves the blood going in and out of your muscles. Waste out - healing stuff in. A by-product of massage and other bodywork therapies is improved energy. With more energy, we will feel more inclined to exercise during the day (preferably in nature) - again helping in the falling asleep process. Too much computer work and screens will tire us mentally but not physically. Bodies don't like that! Brains don't like these blue screens. We suggest no screens for two hours before you want to go to sleep.

**Nutrition** is important, eat a healthy unprocessed diet, no caffeine in the evening, drink water to help keep your body hydrated. Camomile tea can help the relaxation.

Have you ever tried to establish a sleep routine? Try going to bed at a regular time, no big meals or exciting movies or worrying news just before. Take a warm bath with a few drops of lavender essential oil (diluted in milk first) and listen to your favourite relaxing music. If your brain won't shut off from worries - then write down what you are thinking and feeling.

Now when you are in bed, lie down and slowly breathe out. Tense your feet, then relax, then your legs, hips, back, hands, arms, shoulders, neck and jaw. Finish by screwing up your face, then letting go. Take your time - there is no rush. Repeat if necessary.

Scan your body for tensions. Breathe into them (through your nose). Don't think - just feel and breathe. At the same time, feel your body being supported on the bed, feel your legs, your arms, your torso, your head on the pillow. If thoughts come in, go back to feeling your body. It will take practice. You may need to write the unwanted 'brain blethers' on a notebook by your bed. Remember, good habits are always more difficult to adopt than bad ones!

If an area wants more attention - great that you found it - breathe into it again and exhale slowly. How does it feel, does it have a colour, a shape? If the left shoulder is a bit tense and you feel the colour is dark, bring in another colour to lighten it. See the colour infiltrating every cell and soothing and healing. Colour is an amazing tool. Does your body need a specific colour to help it drift into sleep? Imagine your body being nurtured and nourished with this colour.

Research from the Touch Research Institute in Miami found that Massage Therapy was effective in helping to get to sleep and sleep longer. Try massaging your feet - especially your toes, use a lavender lotion. Breathe with that longer outer breath, as you do it. (*Massaging baby's toes and feet should help with restless nights, too.*)

These are tools that you can modify to suit you. Our body stores our emotions, thoughts and past experiences so paying attention to it pays dividends.

### A WORD FROM THE DOC...

#### **Summer Survival**

We have managed to stagger through the last winter, which for all of us has been a challenge and really exhausting as well. With summer

on the way, I do hope that we will be less busy, but I fear that hope is mis-placed as we are almost daily swamped with people wanting advice for what really should be things that you do not need to speak to a doctor about - or any health professional. Most acute illnesses we encounter are what we medics call 'self-limiting', which means they eventually settle and there is no specific therapy beyond using medication such as paracetamol to relieve symptoms. Many seek to use the internet for advice or to self-diagnose, and instead of finding reassurance become convinced that they have a need to be 'checked over', creating a significant workload. It is important to remember that the most used search engine is American, and so will drive you to seek medical advice as our medical colleagues across the pond earn more when they see you - if you have insurance, or the money to pay that is. NHS Inform is a good starting point for online advice - this is the Scottish Health Service information site and is the most useful and relevant.

I hope that this missive will give some simple advice to help you to help yourselves and hopefully reduce the huge number of calls we get daily, as some days we near 1,000 calls when we are open (and that is sadly NOT a typo).

With summer you will still encounter various viral illnesses such as coughs, colds and dear old Covid-19 too. Upset tummies with travel or a dodgy bit of barbequing are common too. Almost always these are things that we do NOT need to be contacted about. I WOULD recommend contact if you have severe, bloody diarrrhoea, have been abroad to somewhere exotic, or perhaps have eaten poorly cooked food as we would then need to consider checking for certain infections such as giardiasis, campylobacter or salmonella. Most dicky tummies need no specific therapy beyond plenty of clear fluids, at least 24 hours off solids and paracetamol for pain. Anti-diarrhoeal and antisickness medications can be taken if you are facing a journey, for example, but taking plenty of clear fluids, resting, having paracetamol if needed for pains and staying home is best. You can get these medications for free (in Scotland) from the pharmacy under the Pharmacy First initiative or buy them over the counter.

A very important infection to be aware of is malaria, so if you are going to the tropics, you MUST take the appropriate preventative medications recommended for the area you are visiting. Malaria is a very serious disease and if you have been to a part of the world where malaria is, and you develop symptoms of fever, chills or shaking (we call this rigors) then you must seek advice immediately.

Please do NOT contact your GP about travel vaccinations or advice. This aspect of work has been taken over by the Health Board and the best place to start looking is NHS Inform.



Wherever you hope to go this summer, and I suspect many will venture abroad after the recent Covid deprivations, it is a good idea to be prepared and have a 'first aid' kit ready. Sun cream and ensuring good sun sense is important, even at home, as sunburn is avoidable if you are sensible.

I would recommend that your first-aid kit should have the following:

- Cleansing wipes, clean cotton swabs and plasters for cuts and scrapes.
- Antihistamine tablets, or mixture if you have younger children (Cetirizine and Loratadine are regarded as non-drowsy and are usually once-daily medications, Chlorphenamine is sedating but a great 'rescue' antihistamine as it works more quickly) for hay fever, insect bites, stings and allergies.
- Antiseptic cream, antihistamine cream and hydrocortisone 1% cream for sting/bite relief.
- Re-hydration sachets in case of diarrhoea.
- Paracetamol/Ibuprofen tablets or mixture if you have younger children.
- A tick remover pack (if you develop a rash or feel unwell in the days or even weeks after a tick bite then it is important to contact us so we can check for Lyme's disease).
- Lastly (but not least) suncream with a good SPF and aftersun cream, even in Bonnie Scotland!

I do hope that this will be useful and mean that you will be better able and feel more confident to 'self-care'. Being prepared and having some basics handy will be very helpful, particularly if travelling away from home.

Please do remember to make sure that you have appropriate travel insurance for foreign travels, particularly in this post Brexit world. Consider getting the new, free, UK Global Health Insurance Card (UK GHIC). This replaces the European Health Insurance Card (EHIC) and means that you can access emergency necessary care in most of Europe. To get a GHIC card requires an online application, take care to avoid websites which charge, this is a FREE card. Be aware the GHIC, like its EHIC predecessor, does not replace insurance which should always be taken out, and remember to declare any pre-existing conditions or you may find yourself uncovered.

I hope we can all enjoy another warm, sunny summertime and that everyone can get a break. Remember, stay active and eat healthily to avoid becoming a regular visitor at the surgery, we have plenty work to keep us going!

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### **POTTERTON VOLUNTEERS**



We tried rather ambitiously to get off to an early start with our work at the Potterton Burn in 2023, scheduling our first workday for a Saturday in early March. Unfortunately, on that day snow lay thick on the ground and it just wasn't a day for gardening! So, we rescheduled for the next Saturday only to be greeted by torrential rain. It was third time lucky, and we managed to get a start on the 1st of April.

We sorted out the far side of the burn, cutting back trees and bushes to avoid leaves blocking the burn. We planted the perennials that we had received from the council along the fence line (photo, right). We added to the fruit trees and bushes by planting out apple and plum trees along with blackberry, redberry and gooseberry bushes. Honeysuckles were planted adjacent to mature trees, where they will hopefully climb up the trunks of the trees. We also planted out some Eared Willow trees.



We were lucky with the weather again two weeks later where we managed to do some more work. Wildflowers were planted, edges along the burn trimmed and we tried to revive some very sorry-looking Christmas trees.

In November 2022 we applied for a grant to buy garden tools for the Potterton Volunteers. We applied to the Formartine Rural Partnership for £500, we were granted the funding. We now have a big bag of tools, which includes a strimmer, a hedge cutter, kneeling pads, trowels, secateurs, and many other goodies.

We meet at the Potterton Burn fortnightly from 11:00 until 13:00 weather permitting! Keep up to date with information about our activities on Potterton Volunteers Facebook page. We would love to have more group members to help with planting around the village. Do come and join us, no gardening knowledge is necessary. Just come along and help us make our village beautiful - and make new friends at the same time!

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### **DELICIOUS DANDELIONS**

Dandelions appear all over our parish and we so often get out the weedkiller to regain a perfect lawn. However, in the grass verges and open ground they provide a wonderful speckly carpet of golden heads, adding to the excitement of summer picnics and outdoor games. Dandelions herald the onset of spring and

summer, being one of the first bloomers. There are over a hundred species of dandelion, all lumped under their scientific name of 'Taraxacum Officinale'.

Thought to be from the French 'Dent-de-Lion' (Lion's Tooth), the dandelion is also called 'Piss-en-Lit' (pee-the-bed). Some north-east folk may also use that name for other plants, usually associated with childhood games of yester year. Dandelion leaves are diuretic, increasing urine production (hence the 'piss-en-lit' name), so can act as a detox for the blood and helps improve kidney and liver function.

Dandelions are hardy and often grow in areas where other plants cannot flourish as the soil is too hard, has too little calcium or is too acidic. It's worth noting that if you try to pull out dandelions during their growing stage, the roots will be hard to remove completely, and they will tend to grow back twice as strong.

Insects benefit from the dandelions as it provides their first food after hibernation, and unlike most other plants, it produces both pollen *and* nectar. Each bright yellow head contains around 100 individual flowers, meaning bees, butterflies and hoverflies flock to them, feasting on their goodness.

Dandelion flowers are delicious to eat too. It used to be called 'gold (or 'honey') of the poor'. The flowers are very sweet and can be used in jam, sauce, or salad. (Check out dandelion recipes online.) Dandelion tea can also have many positive effects on the digestive system (but do check this with your doctor if you are taking prescribed medication).

Eventually these beautiful flowers turn to white globes of exposed seeds ready to be dispersed in the breeze. Children play their own part in this as they pick the puffballs, close their eyes, make a wish and blow the seeds, helping to disperse them and produce a new generation of dandelions.
